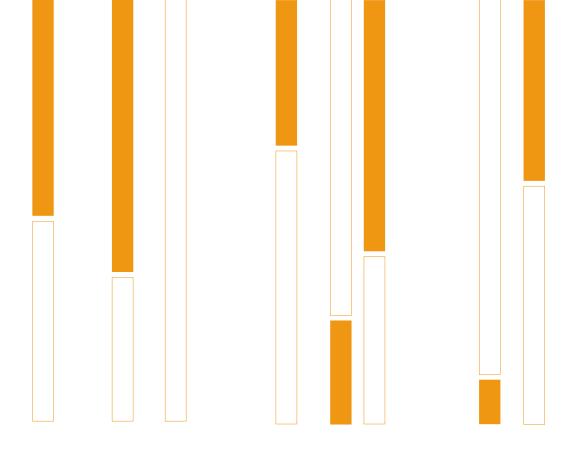

# ABOUT THE WORKSHOP

The open access publishing market is growing rapidly in both volume and value, as researchers, globally, publish an increasing proportion of their articles in scholarly journals that charge fees for open access publishing services. While the rise of open access brings the benefit of public access to research, replacing the subscription paradigm with an open access paradigm in scholarly journal publishing raises new concerns around equity.

It is important to identify the financial barriers that authors encounter and hear the challenges they face, particularly in resource-limited contexts, in order to develop actionable plans and practical mechanisms that ensure no author is limited in their opportunity to publish their accepted articles open access in the journals of their choice.

The scholarly communication ecosystem is complex and demands **a multitude of approaches** involving **all actors** among organizations that fund and produce research, to ensure that open access is delivered to the research community under conditions that are globally equitable.

Scientists and scholars, research administrators, libraries and library consortia, university leadership, science councils and grant funders, and ministries of research and education, all have a role to play.

#### WORKSHOP APPROACH

The workshop series is organized to facilitate discussions among actors from all geographic and economic contexts with the aim of collaborating on the development of practical mechanisms and concrete solutions that would foster an open scholarly publishing paradigm based on these core principles:

- Scholarly communication is part of the research process and, as such, costs for open access publishing services should ultimately be borne by research funders and institutions;
- Fees associated with open access publishing services should be fair, reasonable, transparent, and globally equitable;
- > Spending on scientific publishing should enable global open access for both readers and authors.

This, first, workshop seeks to highlight perspectives and viewpoints from Africa and Europe. Through plenary sessions and breakout discussions, workshop participants will be invited to brainstorm and explore both immediate and long-term actions that different actors can take to advance toward an open access publishing paradigm in accordance with the principles above.

# ABOUT THE WORKSHOP

#### **GUIDING QUESTIONS**

While discount and waiver programs can only be considered a short-term strategy, how can they be improved to deliver immediate benefits to authors in limited resource contexts? What can different actors do to promote such improvements?

Working toward more permanent solutions, what actions by different stakeholders could foster a scholarly publishing system in which fees for open access publishing services are differentiated globally in a way that is fair and transparent?

To support strategies aimed at promoting a just scholarly publishing ecosystem, how might organizations that fund and produce research gain a clearer understanding of the current financial streams in scholarly publishing and how these might be adjusted to support all authors?

What collaborations and alignments can be formed to build the knowledge, capacities, practices and infrastructure to support global open access for both readers and authors?

#### **WORKSHOP OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Generate a better understanding among actors of the state of play in the scholarly publishing market and how the underlying financial streams currently flow
- 2. Develop ideas for concrete mechanisms or practical steps different actors can take to advance toward an open access paradigm in accordance with the principles above.

#### **WORKSHOP OUTCOMES**

The outcomes of this first workshop will be integrated with those of two additional and incremental workshops in early 2023 featuring viewpoints and contributions from the Asia-Pacific region and the Americas, with the aim of defining and promoting global practices and action lines in pursuit of the principles above.
